

His name was Keven Shorts and he came from a sports family. His father was a boxing coach and his older brother, Cecil, was a wide receiver for the Tarblooders . So the best thing was we had a star football player as a mentor and coach, and that made our team more

competitive. Kevin made us feel like we were champions. He taught us plays such as pass plays , trick plays and defensive plays. He made us feel that we truly were winners! Since we were from 146th street and Aspinwall and the other team was from 148 St. there was a natural competitiveness. They were also pretty good so we knew that we had to play hard. The game would be a fierce one but only one team would win the game.

There was another nemesis everyone had to beat was the street lights! Because it was getting late both teams decided that whoever scored the next touchdown would win the game so that meant HAIL MARY TIME! We went into a huddle and Kevin described the play that were going to run. The play was designed to fake the ball to Makell, our running back. Everyone was to run to the end-zone. Kevin stepped back, faked the ball to Makell and then threw a bomb toward the end zone. Most everyone on both teams ran into the end-zone. Robert, Joe and I all jumped up for the ball. The defensive team crowded around us. I got smarter and separated myself from everyone else. The ball was in the air and everyone was fighting for the ball. I was looking up at the ball. I was so focused on nothing but that football and my hands were stretched out to grab the ball. There was a lot of struggling and scrapping for the prize but all of a sudden that prize floated right into my hands. TOUCH DOWN! My teammates ran up to me hugging me and. It was the best day of my life. It helped me believe what Kevin was trying to teach us—I can be a winner.
